Horticulturalist Sarah and her small team. which includes four volunteers, are responsible for the mammoth task of looking after our extensive 24-acre site. It includes lawns, a historic rose garden, woodland and a sensory garden. Our site has more than 1,000 shrubs and trees which are all protected. Each residential house has its own garden too. So Sarah and the team are busy all year round.

Sarah enjoys talking with children and their families. Many have spent months in hospital so our grounds are literally a 'breath of fresh air'. Children love asking Sarah questions,



most often about her tractor! "It's lovely to see everyone enjoying our great outdoors," said Sarah, "I feel very privileged to work here and to be custodian of these historic grounds".

Our experienced team of therapists get to know the children and young people we support and use their expertise to create a tailored therapy plan. We integrate technology into our therapy, to help them achieve their individual goals.

As rehabilitation specialists, we were selected as the only UK paediatric centre to trial **ROBERT®**. This innovative robotic device offers intensive rehabilitation for arms and legs, allowing early mobilisation to help ensure the best possible recovery.

Another cutting-edge technology is **DIEGO**. It takes away the effect of gravity, so children



can use their arms with less effort. Children can practice functional movements whilst playing fun computerised games, and re-learn everyday things, like eating and getting dressed.

To help children with physical disabilities to stand and move around more easily, we also use **Innowalk PRO**, a robotic therapy device.

Beyond our gates

Have you wondered what's beyond the gates at Tadworth Court? A country mansion has been here since the 17th century. Caring for children on site began in 1927 when Peter Reid left a legacy of £20,000 to create a country branch of Great Ormond Street Children's Hospital.

In 1984 The Children's Trust became proud custodians. Today it's home to our specialist

rehabilitation service for children with acquired brain injury. We are trusted and recognised as the country's leading centre of excellence.

Our team of experts care for some of the most vulnerable children with brain injury, neurodisability and complex needs from right across the UK. Over the years, our amazing supporters have helped us create specialist, purpose-built facilities all on one historic site.



Let us show you around

- 1 Hydrotherapy pool for rehabilitation, physical development and wellbeing.
- 2 New Cheyne Centre our therapy centre, funded through legacy donations. A variety of sessions take place here including physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech and language therapy, psychological support, music therapy and play therapy. It houses a gymnasium for physiotherapy sessions, an occupational therapy kitchen, a sensory room, a music room, a soft play facility as well as school classrooms.
- 3 The Children's Trust School for children with complex health and medical needs, alongside multiple barriers to learning.
- 4 Family accommodation we have a range of options for parents and carers to stay on-site.

- 5 Mansion including reception, offices, canteen and meeting rooms.
- 6 Rose garden heritage garden set out in original 17th century style.
- 7 Residential houses we have 8 residential homes located across our site for children visiting us for neurorehabilitation and for residential pupils from The Children's Trust School. Our residential houses provide a home from home atmosphere.



Making music together


Children love music therapy because it's fun and creative. Music can activate and stimulate many different areas of the brain at the same time, helping strengthen and build new connections after a brain injury.

We use music therapy to support concentration, memory, attention, communication, movement and social skills. It can also help express emotions, reduce anxiety, boost mood and improve wellbeing.

Noah's story

Noah was three days old when a scan revealed a very large bleed on his brain. When Noah woke after brain surgery, his parents Heidii and Tom were devastated to hear that he had a severe brain injury.

Noah came to The Children's Trust for specialist support two years later. Noah's brain injury meant that he was struggling with his coordination and balance and would frequently fall over and hurt himself. He had also lost communication skills which meant he was unable to ask for help and often felt frustrated.

Our team worked with his family to set goals for Noah. Mum Heidii said: "One of the main goals with Noah was to provide him with some stability in movement. We also wanted him to be able to integrate his right arm as a helper hand and learn to use his fingers, as his right arm, hand and fine motor skills were impacted by his brain injury."

We put a personalised therapy programme in place for Noah. Our specialist team worked with Noah in physiotherapy, occupational therapy, hydrotherapy, speech and language therapy and support from a psychologist. Play and leisure





activities were incorporated into his treatment plan. His family stayed onsite and joined in with play therapy and family outings.

Noah's progress after his eight-week placement.

Noah automatically used his right arm for twohanded activities. He could feed himself and enjoyed mealtimes. He communicated using linked sentences and a wider vocabulary.

How is Noah today? Noah returned to his nursery, where he has independently joined in with painting, drawing and building blocks. "Our aim is that by the time he goes to school, he's able to join in with his peers," said Heidii.



Vital volunteers



Tim volunteers up to three times a week, driving children to medical appointments or on fun days out. His support means families can focus on what's important. Like having fun and enjoying a day out, or attending a hospital appointment without the stress of the journey, the worry and expense of parking or unloading equipment.

Sometimes Tim takes a family home after their placement here has ended, like 14 year old Harley who came to Tadworth Court for intensive rehabilitation after an accident on his scooter caused a serious brain injury. Before driving Harley home to Warwickshire, Tim was delighted to attend his bell ringing ceremony. It marked the end of Harley's treatment and was attended by staff and family members. On the trip Harley's excitement grew as he got closer





to home. "It was so rewarding to be part of his journey," says Tim.

"I wanted to find a local charity to get involved with. That was 13 years ago, and I've been volunteering ever since."
